2. Books Vocabulary

- **bookworm** (noun) – *someone who loves to read; someone who is always reading.*
- **biography / autobiography** (nouns) – *a biography is a book written about a person, whereas an autobiography is a book written by a person about themselves.*
- **page-turner** (noun) – *a book that is so enthralling you want to turn the page quickly to find out what happens next.*
- **e-book** (noun) – *a digital version of a book.*
- **e-reader** (noun) – *a device to read e-books.*
- **to read someone like a book** (idiom) – *to easily understand someone's motivations or thoughts.*
