2. Utopia/Dystopia Vocabulary

- **utopia** (noun) – *an imaginary perfect world.*
- **dystopia** (noun) – *a real or imagined society usually characterised by a lack of freedom, oppression and fear.*
- **dictator** (person), **dictatorship** (regime) (nouns) – *a ruler that holds absolute power, often obtained by force and maintained by oppression; a regime ruled by a dictator.*
- **totalitarianism** (noun), **totalitarian** (adjective) – *a form of government or government policies that controls all aspects of its citizen's lives, often by force.*
- **to rule with an iron fist** (idiom) – *to rule in an extremely strict, cruel, tyrannical or oppressive way or with absolute control.*
- **to be away with the fairies, to live in cloud cuckoo land, to have one's head in the clouds** (idioms) – *describes someone who is easily distracted, lives in a dreamworld, or is excessively idealistic.*
