2. Identity Theft Vocabulary

- **credit card fraud** (noun) – *a crime for financial gain which uses a stolen credit card or the details of another person's credit card without their consent.*
- **to clone / skim (a credit card)** (verb) – *to copy details from a credit card in order to commit credit card fraud.*
- **fake ID** (noun) – *a counterfeit identity card.*
- **phishing** (noun) – *an attempt to trick a person into disclosing personal information using official-looking electronic messages (for example, emails or text messages).*
- **impostor** (noun) – *a person who pretends to be another person.*
- **to impersonate** (verb) – *to pretend to be another person by copying their behaviour or characteristics.*
